

Alabama Historical Society announces Baldwin County Cemeteries listed in the Alabama Historical Cemetery Register September 22,2021.

The Baldwin County Genealogical Society received news three more historic cemeteries have been added to the State's official listing of historic cemteries in Alabama: Shellbanks Baptist Church Cemetery, Gasque Community; Navy Cove Cemetery, Navy Cove/Pilot Community; (also know as the Lost Cemetery) and Coburn-Lagoon Cemetery (New Miller Memorial Cemetery).

There are now 17 cemeteries in Baldwin County listed in the Alabama Historic Cemetery Register, which features 943 cemeteries statewide.



One of the earliest documents of **Frank Fesler** as founder of the newspaper *Onlooker*, is *The Inland Printer* which gives a

description of the home of the *newspaper* by its editor/publisher, **Frank Fesler**.



FRANK FESLER, first editor of The Foley Onlooker, who came to Foley almost 16 years ago when there was practically nothing in Baldwin county but pine trees. Mr. Fesler seen the then barren and "wild country" transferred into one of the most productive and valuable sections of the state. Five years ago Mr. Fesler went to Owensmouth, Calif., where he now edits The Gazette.

Ideal Home of a Country Newspaper features the photograph shown above as home of the Foley (Ala.) **Onlooker** with **Frank Fesler**, the proprietor who calls it a "model Bungalow Print-shop," and describes it thus: "the new home of the **Onlooker** is of concrete in imitation of stone, 22.8 by 60 feet, with ten-foot ceiling, has light all around, concrete foundation for gasoline engine and Hoe newspaper press. I have two jobbers, five double stands full of type, three imposing-stones, paper-cutter, etc. The Onlooker is a four year old, eight-column folio, home print, and doing pretty well, thank you." The picture indicate that Mr. Fesler is not troubled by very close neighbors, and his home must be a very prominent feature in the landscape of Foley. The prominent sign, with no other advertising matter on the walls or in the windows, shows good judgment, and it stands out like the principal line in a well-displayed ad, states *The Inland Printer*.

Second of early documents showing **Frank Fesler, Editor and Publisher,** is in the *N. W. Ayer & Son's Newspaper Annual and Directory*, 1912, listing "**Foley**, pop. #300, with **Baldwin County** population at 18,178, **Louisv. & Nash. R. R.**, Tel., Exp., Bank, Potato growing and general farming" describing the area. *Onlooker* (newspaper) issued on

Wednesdays, Republican, 1907, with 4 sheets at 20x22, subscription of \$1.50, yearly subscriptions totaled \$1,072. *History of Kansas newspapers* states the "Onlooker, independent: founded 1903 by Frank Fesler."

Fesler, son of **W. H. Fesler**, was born in 1873 in New York, married teacher **Kate Dresbach** in Feb 1907 in Franklin, Ohio. By 1910, Frank was back in Foley with wife and daughter **Janie** age three. In October, 1910, a local advertisement displayed the "Fesler & Coenen Real Estate, Insurance, Rents, Loans, Etc.", with slogan "Try us at any angle" Daughter **Foler S.** joined the Fesler family in February, 1911, son **Paul** joined by 1913.

Fesler was owner, listed as an editor, managing editor, business manager and publisher of the Onlooker which was stated as free from bonds, mortgages, or security holders, sworn to and subscribed before P. J. Cooney, notary public on 30 July, 1913. Fesler was an advocate for the farmers of south Baldwin County writing in their defense for criticisms in a *Demopolis Times* article about sweet potato farmers "banked" their potatoes rather than sell, to wait for a better price than 35 cents a bushel. Fesler replied with almost full column testimony defense of the farmers' reasons. **Fesler** also was authorized by the **Magnolia Springs Land Co**. to "sell all of the unsold land lying North of the Section line in the town site of Foley at \$150 for the first acre, \$125 for additional acres."

Frank Fesler had many talents, one was as a poet. *Lawyers and Poetry* writes "**Frank Fesler** is a lawyer and newspaper owner ... [H]is work has appeared mainly in newspapers." His works were published: *Lady with a Flair: Lyrics and Poems*. Fesler was also editor of the *Labor Record* in Kansas City. His newspapers were often filled with his wit, humor and philosophy, one such in 1910: "Getting something for nothing, is like getting a tooth pulled under laughing gas, make you act foolish and leaves an after pain and a void." As early as 1907, Fesler published a musical composition of "much merit, writing both words and music."

Recorded September, 1922, **Fesler** sold the *Onlooker* newspaper to **Frank Barchard Sr**, an assignee of **N. J. Lillard**; same date selling his and Kate's property to **Frank Barchard**. Fesler had already been appointed U. S. Postmaster in **Owensmouth**, **Los Angeles**, **CA**. He became editor of the *Owensmouth News*, then bought the *Inglewood Gazette* newspaper where his son **Paul** would be associated with his father. He later sold the *Gazette* to become engaged in real estate business.

In June 1954, the *Los Angeles Times* noted **Frank Fesler** died, his wife **Kate** preceding him in June, 1946. He left survivors daughters **Flora Hughes, Janis Diamond** and son **Paul Felser**, nine grandchildren. Both **Frank Fesler** and his wife are buried in Inglewood Cemetery in California.

Great-granddaugher **Susan Ney**, visiting here from California, claims her 'wandering spirit' from her great-grandparents, **Frank and Kate Fesler**, who traveled through many states leaving their footprints, including **Foley**, **Alabama**. The original *Onlooker* building still stands on Mckenzie Street with a different front entrance but the "concrete imitation stones" remains on back part of the building.

Two reminders of Onlooker's founder, editor and publisher Frank Fesler "footprints" remain for us to ponder in society today as when they were printed.

In 1941:

A *Triolet About a Debt
Too many ciphers in our debt
Means billions we must really pay:
As debtors we shall long regret
Too many ciphers in our debt:
Unless defaulters get their way
And thus annul the debt some day
Too many ciphers in our debt
Means billions we must REALLY PAY.

In 1950: In Happier Day

Back when the dollar was worth 100 cents we sue to get a haircut for 25 cents and the barbershop was a happy place. Now it costs \$1.25 and barbershop is not a happy place.
